How long does it take for a buyer to find the perfect home?

O nce you have made the most important decision to purchase a home, your trusted Realtor will help guide you through all of the steps of your home buying process.

Once pre-approved, the buyer and Realtor will start searching out homes and towns you prefer. Then begin narrowing down particular homes by criteria such as how many bedrooms, baths and square footage. Do you need upgrades or are you willing to do a little cosmetic work? Do you require move-in condition? Home styles — such as do you prefer an open floor plan or upper-level bedrooms, colonial, Cape-style, specific neighborhoods, location to work and topography — all come into play to make these extremely important decisions easier for you.

Many of these decisions can be discussed in a sit-down meeting up front or within the first few visits. So if a buyer is very motivated they may only look for a couple of weekends. Some very organized buyers even can find the perfect house right away, while other buyers may actively search the Internet and email directly with their agent on a longer term.
