Latimer & Jenkins Exchange Nods for County Executive

State Sen. George Latimer and County Legislator Ken Jenkins, two Democrats seeking to be their party's nominee to run for county executive this fall against Robert Astorino, released recent endorsements to their campaigns.

This latest announcement comes on the heels of other recent major endorsements and further builds his momentum going into the May 10 Democratic convention.

Rye Arts Center Spring Gala to Honor Artists

The Rye Arts Center will host its annual gala, "A Vision In Rye," on Friday, May 12 at Doral Arrowwood in Rye Brook. The event will honor Bob Clyatt, a sculptor who has been instrumental in the Rye Arts Center's public art initiative; and Brigitte Loritz, a watercolorist who has taught at the Rye Arts Center for more than 30 years.

The gala is the organization's primary fundraiser to support its extensive network of outreach programs. A selection of these activities include in-school programs that bring arts education into hundreds of classrooms; partnerships with Head Start, the Don Bosco Community Center, the Community Resource Center, and the Boys and Girls Club of Greenwich to provide arts education to at-risk youth; free specialized dance classes for seniors who suffer from Parkinson's Disease; and \$25,000 in scholarships for the Rye Arts Center arts classes and lessons.

Organized by committee members and staff, the gala is led by co-chairpersons Fiona and Ozen Dogan, Lisa and Robert Miller, Judith and Bill Passannante, and Nicole and Rob Weber.

In addition to cocktails and dinner, the event will include live music, and live and silent auctions. The auction items include week-long getaways, event tickets - and everything in-between - and will be available for advance online bidding.

There will be a mini-art sale of works by both honorees Bob Clyatt and Brigitte Loritz, and arts activities including mini-sculptures with Terry Taylor and a community painting with Nestor Madalengoitia. Comedian Kim Berns will conduct "red carpet" interviews for a new show on RyeTV, called "Rye Witness News with Kim Berns."

"Given that it's an arts center, we are excited to break the mold of the standard gala and infuse the event with some fun and creativity," said Fiona Dogan.

Bob Clyatt was born in Oakland and lives and works in Rye, as well as Chelsea, New York City. His work has been exhibited in solo shows in Santa Fe and New York, as well as group shows around the world. His sculptures are in permanent collections of the Burchfield-Penney museum in Buffalo, and Museo Arte Contemporanea Sicilia in Italy. His work has been reviewed in numerous art publications and featured in the New York Times, Wall Street Journal, Fox News and other national media.

Clyatt spent eight years in formal study of sculpture, centering on his years at the Art Students League of New York under the guidance of Barney Hodes. At The Rye Arts Center he curated "Beyond Rodin: Contemporary Figurative Sculpture" and has been the driving force behind The Rye Arts Center's public art initiative.

Brigitte Loritz was born and educated in Switzerland and studied at the Kunstgewerbeschule in Zurich. In the U.S., she attended Parson's School of Art and Design, and has studied under such prominent watercolorists as Ed Whitney, Jane Carlson, Arnie Lindmark, Janet Walsh, Mel Stabin and Diane Faxon. She has won numerous awards and has exhibited throughout New York, Connecticut and Switzerland.

Loritz' paintings are in private collections around the world. She has taught at The Rye Arts Center for more than 30 years and conducts workshops in transparent watercolor and mixed-media classes for adults and children in various schools in Westchester County.
