

Seixas. "And occasionally we would find a little hay just tucked away somewhere, so it was fun." Seixas and her late husband were the only owners of the house, which, at three bedrooms across more than 3,400-square-feet of living space, doesn't count as one of the more vast Cady homes. Still, the owners found it perfect. "Each room is its own entity but they flow into each other, very comfortable for two of us but expanded to suit family when they came," she said. "The upstairs, except for master, was loft space and all old barn wood, so it maintained barn feeling." Listing agent Irit Granger said that, even as far as Cady houses go, this one stands out for its age. "This is one of Cady's earlier barn homes in the area," said Granger. "The materials in the house, you probably can't find them anymore," he said, since barns have become such a popular source to reclaim for buildings.
